






MINUTES OF THE SECOND MEETING OF THE BOARD OF STUDIES

BOS 2023.01.01 - To confirm the Minutes of the First Meeting of the Board of Studies in Law held on 27th June 2022.

BOS 2023. 01.02 – To apprise the Board about the change to be made in the Clause relating to Admission Eligibility specified in the Academic and Examinations Regulations, 2022 and to seek approval for the same.

Academic and Examination Regulations, 2022 of the Centre of Legal Education – Marks in the qualifying examination under Admissions Eligibility Clause of the LL.B. (Three Year Programme) and B.A.LL.B. (Five Year Integrated Programme).



Under Sub – Clause (2) of Clause 3, instead of “However, in case of candidates belonging to Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe, 40% of total marks in the qualifying examination is enough”, the following shall be inserted”.

“However, 40% of total marks in the qualifying examination is sufficient in case of candidates belonging to Puducherry Scheduled Caste and Scheduled Tribe”.

BOS 2023. 01.03 – To apprise the Board about the introduction of Special Examination for students who are likely to miss the opportunity of writing the scheduled End Semester Examination because of his/ her participation in the State/National/International level events/ competitions/sports with the previous approval of the Dean of the Centre of Legal Education or anyone authorized in this behalf, which is already approved by the Governing Body and Academic Council.

Academic and Examinations Regulations, 2022 of the Centre of Legal Education - Special Examination for students of LL.B. (Three Year Programme) and B.A.LL.B. (Five Year integrated Programme).

SPECIAL EXAMINATION

LL.B. – Three Year Programme

A new sub - clause may be inserted in the Regulations after Sub – Clause 6.4:

“6.5 Special Examinations: Any student who is eligible to appear for the End Semester Examination in any or all courses of a semester which is due, but unable to appear for the same because of his/her participation in the State/National/International level events/competitions /sports with the previous approval of the Dean of the Centre of Legal Education or anyone authorized in this behalf, may be permitted to appear in the Special Examination conducted in any or all courses of the said semester for the said purpose but not otherwise”.

B.A.LL.B.– Five Year Integrated Programme

A new sub – clause may be inserted in the Regulations after Sub – Clause 7.4:

“7.5 Special Examinations: Any student who is eligible to appear for the End Semester Examination in any or all courses of a semester which is due, but unable to appear for the same because of his/her participation in the State/National/International level events/competitions /sports with the previous approval of the Dean of the Centre of Legal Education or any one authorized in this behalf , may be permitted to appear in the Special Examination conducted in any or all courses of the said semester for the said purpose but not otherwise”.



BOS.2023.01.04 – To apprise the Board about the introduction of a scheme for re – earning of CIA/CAM for those students who fail in the first attempt of writing the End Semester Examination of a course which is already approved by the General Body and the Academic Council.

Academic and Examinations Regulations, 2022 of the Centre of Legal Education – Provision for re – earning CIA/CAM for the students of LL.B. (Three Year Programme) and B.A.LL.B. (Five Year Integrated Programme)

ARREAR COURSE REGISTRATION

LL.B - Three Year Programme

- (1). The existing provision of Clause 16 may be read as Sub Clause (1) of Clause 16.
- (2). Two new Sub – Clauses may be inserted as Sub – Clause (2) and (3) of 16 as under:

“Sub Clause (2): Provided that if any student who could not secure passing minimum marks in the first appearance of the End Semester Examination of a course, is desirous of re - earning the Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) marks already secured for the said course, may be permitted to re – register upon payment of the prescribed fee and to re – appear in the Examination of the said course in the subsequent semester and for the purpose of improving the performance of CIA, (including appearing in all written tests, submission of project and presentation/ viva voce appearance as per the Regulations”).

Sub clause (3): Where the student concerned re – appears in the examination of the said course and completes all the components of the CIA as per the regulations, marks secured by him/her in his/ her first appearance or re – appearance for CIA whichever is higher, shall be considered as marks secured by him/ her in the said course”.

B. A. LL.B. – Five Year Integrated Programme

- (1). The existing provision of Clause 17 may be read as Sub Clause (1) of Clause 17.
- (2). Two new Sub – Clauses may be inserted as Sub – Clause (2) and (3) of 17 as under:

“Sub Clause (2): Provided that if any student who could not secure passing minimum works in the first appearance of the End Semester Examination of a course, is desirous of re - earning the Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) marks already secured for the said course, may be permitted to re – register upon payment of the prescribed fee and to re – appear in the Examination of the said course in the subsequent semester and for the said purpose of improving the performance of CIA, (including appearing in all written tests, submission of project and presentation/ viva voce as per the Regulations”).

“Sub Clause (3): Where the student concerned re – appears in the examination of the said course and completes all the components of the CIA as per the Regulations, marks secured by him/

(Five Year Integrated Programme) and adoption of the same prospectively which is already approved by the General Body and the Academic Council.



BOS 2023.01.09 – Any other item with the permission of the Chair.










Minutes of the meeting

A. Drafting Pleading and Conveyance. (45 marks)

1. Drafting of pleading - General principles involved in the drafting of the following shall be taught along with the relevant provisions.

(I) Civil Pleadings:

Plaint, written statement, interlocutory application along with affidavit, original petition, execution petition, memorandum of appeal and revision, petition under Article 226 and 32 of the Constitution of India including Public Interest Litigation.

(ii) Criminal proceedings:

Complaint, criminal miscellaneous petition, bail application, memorandum of appeal and revision.

(Students shall do 15 practical exercises in drafting of pleadings (carrying 3 marks each) and submit the same in record form.

B. Drafting of conveyance (45 marks)

1. Sale deed, mortgage deed, lease deed, gift deed, promissory note, special and general power of attorney, will, trust deed, partition deed and partnership deed.

(Students shall do 15 practical exercises in drafting of pleadings (carrying 3 marks each) and submit the same in record form.)

C. Viva voce (10 marks)
